and my own know me, just as the Father knows me

and I know the Father;

and I lay down my life for my sheep. And there are other sheep I have

that are not of this fold,

and these I have to lead as well.

They too will listen to my voice, and there will be only one flock

and one shepherd. The Father loves me,

because I lay down my life in order to take it up again.

No one takes it from me:


I lay it down of my own free will,

and as it is in my power to lay it down, so it is in my power to take it up again; and this is the command I have been

given by my Father.'

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## Reflection by Dianne Bergant CSA

This Sunday is traditionally known as Good Shepherd Sunday. Two major themes emerge from the readings: an image of the one who saves; and the power of salvation itself. The one who saves is not a mighty warrior who comes in military array. In fact, he is the one who was rejected, who was hunted down, humiliated, tortured and hung naked on a tree, there to die in shame. The one who saves is the cornerstone of the building, holding it together, forming a firm foundation so that the structure will not collapse. The one who saves is a lowly shepherd, entrusted with sheep, not with the affairs of state. The one who saves is an unlikely

saviour. This characterization should give us pause. Is it possible that we have been looking for a saviour in the wrong places?

God's saving power flows steadfast covenant love. It broke open the world in the death and resurrection of Jesus and it overflows as healing grace. The saving power in the name of Jesus, a name that itself means 'saviour' (cf. Matt 1:21), is for all people, even for those sheep who do yet belong to this fold. Furthermore, it is for all time; God's mercy endures forever. Through our baptism we can bring the saving grace of God to a world in desperate need of healing. We can do this in our families, in our local communities, in the workplace, in so many situations of our lives.

#### The Vocation we all have

Our newly established Catholic Faith Community of St Luke's, Marsden Park has already been graced with many blessings.

And we pray that God continues to shower blessings upon us.

As we celebrate Good Shepherd Sunday today our mind normally turns to praying for vocations to the priesthood and religious life. I hope you can also remember to pray for vocations to Diaconate – the order of deacons - to which I belong.

But it is also a time to remember the vocation of marriage, the most common vocation of all believers. As I mentioned in my homily last week, Pope Francis has spoken of how spouses attain holiness through the kind acts to each other and their children.

There is also a calling we all have to be a disciple of Jesus Christ. This can be achieved by taking up the challenge to be an active follower of our Risen Saviour. We do this by engaging in actions to make Christ present in the world through the way we live.

In our new community of St Luke's we are calling on people to perhaps get outside of their comfort zones and to help the community to flourish. As we are in a constantly growing suburb, it is possible we will have new people visiting us each week. So, it is vital that we have welcomers to make them feel at home. People to greet them in the car park and at the door to our place of worship.

We need people to provide and serve food after Mass so that we can demonstrate hospitality and provide a forum for people to meet other members of the community.

We need people to go out from this community to provide support to people in our city who struggle more than we do – people like the homeless, aged and sick.

We need people to support our liturgy to be vibrant and well run by helping out with music, by reading, by acting as acolytes, altar servers and extraordinary ministers of Communion.

We need people to help the younger members of our community understand their faith through children's liturgy.

So, we need lots of people to help make St Luke's all that it can be.

After Mass today we will be asking people to nominate for some rosters for various roles and ministries. It is not a lifetime commitment, just whatever time and support you can give in the next few months. As more people join us we hope there will be more volunteers to help out.



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ery little is actually known about the real life of St. George other than he was martyred in Palestine during Christian persecution in the third or fourth century. The most famous legend depicts George as a young soldier who rescued a maiden princess from a dragon at Silene in Libya. His actions, inspired by his belief, led the townsfolk to convert to Christianity. George refused any reward for his heroic deeds, but rather, he encouraged the people to show compassion towards the poor. He became the patron saint of England, which adopted St. George's flag (a red cross on a white background) as its national flag.
