6th Sunday of Easter

First Reading

Acts 10:25-26,34-35,44-48

As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up,' he said 'I am only a man after all!'

Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.'

While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 21(22):26-28,30-32

The Lord has revealed to the nations his saving power.

Sing a new song to the Lord for he has worked wonders. His right hand and his holy arm have brought salvation.

The Lord has made known his salvation; has shown his justice to the nations. He has remembered his truth and love for the house of Israel.

All the ends of the earth have seen the salvation of our God. Shout to the Lord, all the earth, ring out your joy.

Second reading

1 John 4:7-10

My dear people, let us love one another since love comes from God and everyone

who loves is begotten by God and knows God. Anyone who fails to love can never have known God, because God is love. God's love for us was revealed when God sent into the world his only Son so that we could have life through him; this is the love I mean: not our love for God, but God's love for us when he sent his Son to be the sacrifice that takes our sins away.

Gospel

John 15:9-17

Jesus said to his disciples:

'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy be complete. This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you. I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business; I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me: no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask him in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'

Reflection: How well do we love?

I wish I had a few dollars for every wedding I've been celebrant for where the couple has chosen the text from St Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians: "Love is patient, love is kind ..."

When it comes to marital love, people get this concept of love.

I think we struggle to apply it when it comes to some other types of relationships. Like the person at work who I just don't get on with. The person in my family who just annoys me. The loud-mouthed person supporting the other team at the footie! Loving them doesn't mean we need to hold hands and say nice things to them.



It does mean that we aim to see them as God sees them – as a beloved child – warts and all.

God loves us as we are, despite out failures. He certainly encourages us to move away from ways that are out of accord with his ways but he never stops loving us.

St John in today's second reading has a comment which jolted me when I read it: "Anyone who fails to love can never have known God, because God is love."

Perhaps God will judge me not by those I love the most but those I love the least.

Can I pray for those who annoy me? Even those who have hurt me?

Even if I can't, can I pray for God to help me to love them?

Perhaps those people we know who are hardest to love are in our lives for a reason — they are the ones to help us best live out our calling as a follower of Christ.

They call all to love – no matter what the cost.

I know I still have much to learn in this area but I am willing to ask God to help me to love those in my life who are hardest to love. To help me see with his eyes. I pray you are able to do the same.
