The Lord says this:

Shout with joy for Jacob! Hail the chief of nations! Proclaim! Praise! Shout: The Lord has saved his people, the remnant of Israel! See, I will bring them back from the land of the North and gather them from the far ends of earth; all of them: the blind and the lame, women with child, women in labour: a great company returning here. They had left in tears, I will comfort them as I lead them back; I will guide them to streams of water, by a smooth path where they will not stumble. For I am a father to Israel, and Ephraim is my first-born son.

Second reading

Heb 5:1-6

Every high priest has been taken out of mankind and is appointed to act for men in their relations with God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins; and so he can sympathise with those who are ignorant or uncertain because he too lives in the limitations of weakness. That is why he has to make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honour on himself, but each one is called by God, as Aaron was. Nor did Christ give himself the glory of becoming high priest, but he had it from the one who said to him: You are my son, today I have become your father, and in another text: You are a priest of the order of Melchizedek, and for ever.

Gospel

Mk 10:46-52

As Jesus left Jericho with his disciples and a large crowd, Bartimaeus (that is, the son of Timaeus), a blind beggar,

was sitting at the side of the road. When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

Reflection: Pray for All Souls

This coming Friday we will celebrate All Souls Day. This is an important day in our Church when we express a number of things:

- Our love and gratitude for those who have gone before us; for the great gift that they were to our life.
- To pray for their eternal happiness with God.

Perhaps one of the most misunderstood teachings of the Church is that relating to Purgatory. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states that: "All who die in God's grace, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven (1030)." In other words, God is so good and pure that most of us will need a bit of cleaning up in order to be able to enter fully into God's presence. And scripture has subtle but clear references to this reality. For example, in 2nd Maccabees (12:46) we read: "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from sins." If everyone who dies goes immediately to Heaven or to Hell, then this verse would be nonsense. Those who are in Heaven have no need of prayer, or being "loosed from sins"; those who are in Hell are unable to benefit from such prayers, because there is no escape from that place.

Therefore, there must be a third place or state, in which some of the dead are currently in the process of being "loosed from sins." All of this explains why, from the earliest days of Christianity, the Church has offered liturgies and prayers for the dead. The souls in purgatory are saved and are going to move into the fullness of heaven. This month we have a chance to pray continually for them. Please take time to write the names of your loved ones in our 'Book of Remembrance' so we can pray for them at every Mass during November.
