First Reading

Is 6:1-8

In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings.

And they cried out to one another in this way, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. His glory fills the whole earth.'

The foundations of the threshold shook with the voice of the one who cried out, and the Temple was filled with smoke. I said: 'What a wretched state I am in! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of hosts.' Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. With this he touched my mouth and said: 'See now, this has touched your lips, your sin is taken away, your iniquity is purged.'

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying: 'Whom shall I send? Who will be our messenger?' I answered, 'Here I am, send me.'

Second reading

1 Cor 15:1-11

Brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established; because the gospel will save you only if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you – believing anything else will not lead to anything. Well then, in the first place, I taught you what I had been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he anneared to lames and then to all the

one expected it. I am the least of the apostles; in fact, since I persecuted the Church of God, I hardly deserve the name apostle; but by God's grace that is what I am, and the grace that he gave me has not been fruitless. On the contrary, I, or rather the grace of God that is with me, have worked harder than any of the others; but what matters is that I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.

Gospel

Lk 5:1-11

Jesus was standing one day by the lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats – it was Simon's – and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat. When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point.

When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon, 'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

Reflection: Inspiration for us all

Today's Gospel is one that we should all find inspiring. Of all the people Jesus could have chosen to be his "wing men", he didn't choose learned scholars or highly pious religious figures. No, he chose a bunch of ordinary fishermen. Jesus saw something in them that others may not have seen. He

being slow to 'get' his teachings, of being fearful under attack, of not getting his core



message that the Messiah would be a person of love, not a dominating military figure. And, in the same way, Jesus knows us and chooses us to follow Him. He knows that we are not perfect, but he knows what is in our heart. He sees our goodness. He calls on us to follow him, as he did with Peter, James and John. Can we do what the disciples did? Can we drop everything and follow Jesus? Leaving everything and following Jesus seems like a daunting thing to do. But Jesus, more than anyone, knows the reality of our life situations. He will not ask of us anything beyond our capacity. No, not all of us are in a position to leave everything behind and go off on a mission somewhere. But that is not what Jesus calls most of us to do. Most of us are called to be the best followers of Christ that we can be right where we are - in our family, our neighbourhood, in the groups we belong to, in our workplaces. We can change the world for the better right where we are. Let's pray that we are open to the prompting of Jesus in our hearts and minds and souls as to how we should do this.
