A MESSAGE FROM DEACON TONY & ANNETTE...



It is with mixed emotions that we prepare to complete our ministry in Marsden Park.

The past seven years have been a richly rewarding time for us. It has been a joy to see our community grow from about 150 people to about 650. While COVID lockdowns were tough on us all, we were amazed at how quickly our community adapted to online liturgies and how many people were actively involved in each liturgy, from musicians, to readers, to children giving their input. It was also a joy to see how quickly we bounced back to 'life as normal' after the 2nd lockdown.

From day one we set out to ensure our pastoral leadership was one that involved many voices. Our initial advisory committee met around our kitchen table and then morphed into a Pastoral Council, a Pastoral Leadership Group and many ministry leaders. We are blessed to now have possibly 150 people involved in some form of ministry which is a very high ratio of our community and one that shows this as an active faith community.

The one constant person through all of our advisory/leadership groups has been Tessie James. Tessie has a great passion for her faith, and in supporting the faith of others, is shown in her leadership of our Faith Enhancement ministry. And, as she loves alliterations, we can honestly laud Terrific Tessie the Tenacious Theologian!

Tessie's husband, James Irudayaraj, has been another constant. James is known by us as the 'Chairman of the Chairmen' as he has led our logistics team from some of the earliest days of St Luke's life. Frankly, we would not have lasted as long here, with all of the weekly physical requirements of moving hundreds of chairs, musical equipment, altars, statues, and numerous other items, if it wasn't for the efforts of James and his team. We will sadly be absent from James' weekly 'photo time' from now on!

We have been blessed with an ever-growing number of choirs at St Luke's. We thank our initial leader of music ministry, Mark Rupac and his successor Antonio Alano and are thankful for Cristina Joya for agreeing to take up this role from 2025. Cristina and Gloria Angeles have done wonderful things with both the St Luke's Choral and Children's choir.

We also thank Richard McMahon and Lisa Bright who provided great leadership support in our initial years.

We thank the leadership of St Luke's Catholic College, especially the initial Principal Leader, Greg Miller, and current leader, Kelly Bauer. They have both been wonderful to work with and strong supporters of a collaborative relationship between our learning and faith communities. We also thank college business manager, Anne Clark, who has been our go-to person for a range of property matters, many of which occur after hours.

Julie Atkins has been the backbone of our Sacramental Program over the past seven years, teaching a majority of the preparation classes and also carrying out the painstaking task of managing a database of hundreds of children and their family details every year, as well as being our key college contact for RE and liturgy matters.

We have already said publicly that while we have three children whom we love dearly, St Luke's feels like our fourth child. We are privileged that all three children have been part of the life of St Luke's from the start with Lisa and Julia undertaking music ministry, Julia leading youth ministry for a number of years, Jamie supporting with youth ministry and serving as an Acolyte. We have also roped in our newest family members: Lisa's husband, Andy, who has been a regular 'roadie' for the girls and helped with many ad-hoc technical issues; Jamie's wife, Sacha, has often helped with PowerPoint clicking at Mass; Julia's fiancé, Pete, has been an occasional musician at Masses and Carols events. And our two granddaughters, Maribel and Charlotte, have added their own touch of cuteness to our liturgical gatherings!

As a community we have shown great powers of adaptability, having Mass in four different locations over the past seven years. We are lucky, however, to have such wonderful facilities within St Luke's Catholic College for our liturgies.

We thank the numerous priests who have come to celebrate Mass at St Luke's including our initial Supervising Priest, Fr Chris deSouza. In the early days, the priests from the Order of St Camilus, Fr Bong, Fr Meng and Fr Dado, were here often. We thank the Jesuits from Emerton and the priests from Marayong for helping us regularly, with special thanks to Fr Kevin Redmond who has also supported us each month in the past year with a College staff Mass and Mass at Marsden Park Community Care. Fathers Paul Marshall and John Frauenfelder from our seminary were great supporters until they took on pastoral leadership of Harris Park Parish last year. We thank Fr Jonas Donasco for his support in more recent times.

Great thanks go to Fr Andrew Hennes and Fr Joseph Nguyen. Fr Andrew has been celebrant for a majority of our Vigil Masses for the past 5 years. Fr Joseph has been a very generous supporter of our community since he arrived in our Diocese from Melbourne and been celebrant for 3 Sunday Masses a month in recent years and also fills in for our Vigil Mass on occasions.

Finally, a huge thank you to Bishop Vincent Long for trusting us to lead this community in a unique pastoral leadership model in what we understand to be the first urban faith community in Australia entrusted to be led by a married deacon and his wife. We have done our best to repay his trust in us.

Many people have been generous in giving thanks to us for what we have done here. The greatest thanks you can give us is by continuing to contribute to the life of St Luke's and growing in your faith life and discipleship of Jesus Christ.

We will miss you but we know that Fr Gayan will be a suitable new parent to our baby, well supported by administration assistant, Ged Oblea!

LITURGY OF THE WORD

Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph - Year C.

First Reading - 1 Sm 1:20-22. 24-28

Hannah conceived and gave birth to a son, and called him Samuel 'since' she said 'I asked the Lord for him.' When a year had gone by, the husband Elkanah went up again with all his family to offer the annual sacrifice to the Lord and to fulfil his vow. Hannah, however, did not go up, having said to her husband, 'Not before the child is weaned. Then I will bring him and present him before the Lord and he shall stay there for ever.' When she had weaned him, she took him up with her together with a three-year-old bull, an ephah of flour and a skin of wine, and she brought him to the temple of the Lord at Shiloh; and the child was with them. They slaughtered the bull, and the child's mother came to Eli. She said, 'If you please, my lord. As you live, my lord, I am the woman who stood here beside you, praying to the Lord. This is the child I prayed for, and the Lord granted me what I asked him. Now I make him over to the Lord for the whole of his life. He is made over to the Lord. 'There she left him, for the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm - Ps 83:2-3. 5-6. 9-10. R. v.5

(R.) How happy they who dwell in your house, O Lord.

Second Reading - Colossians 3:12-17

You are God's chosen race, his saints; he loves you and you should be clothed in sincere compassion, in kindness and humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with one another; forgive each other as soon as a quarrel begins. The Lord has forgiven you; now you must do the same. Over all these clothes, to keep them together and complete them, put on love. And may the peace of Christ reign in your hearts, because it is for this that you were called together as parts of one body. Always be thankful. Let the message of Christ, in all its richness, find a home with you. Teach each other, and advise each other, in all wisdom. With gratitude in your hearts sing psalms and hymns and inspired songs to God; and never say or do anything except in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through him.

Gospel Acclamation - Acts of the Apostles 16:14

Alleluia, alleluia! Open our heart, O Lord, to listen to the words of your Son. Alleluia!

Gospel - Luke 2:41-52

Every year the parents of Jesus used to go to Jerusalem for the feast of the Passover. When he was twelve years old, they went up for the feast as usual. When they were on their way home after the feast, the boy Jesus stayed behind in Jerusalem without his parents knowing it. They assumed he was with the caravan, and it was only after a day's journey that they went to look for him among their relations and acquaintances. When they failed to find him they went back to Jerusalem looking for him everywhere. Three days later, they found him in the Temple, sitting among the doctors, listening to them, and asking them questions; and all those who heard him were astounded at his intelligence and his replies. They were overcome when they saw him, and his mother said to him, 'My child, why have you done this to us? See how worried your father and I have been, looking for you.' 'Why were you looking for me?' he replied. 'Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?' But they did not understand what he meant. He then went down with them and came to Nazareth and lived under their authority. His mother stored up all these things in her heart. And Jesus increased in wisdom, in stature, and in favour with God and men.

FAMILY CONNECTION

Today's Gospel describes a time of anxiety in the life of Jesus' family. We can imagine their panic and worry as they discovered that Jesus was not with the caravan returning to Nazareth. The Holy Family journeyed with family members and friends be-



cause traveling alone was dangerous.

When they found Jesus at the Temple, Jesus spoke like a typical adolescent, unsympathetic to his parents' concern. Yet his words teach an important lesson about reducing anxiety in our family life. In essence, Jesus says, "If you had remembered who I am, you would have known where to find me." In their panic, Mary and Joseph had forgotten what had been told to them before Jesus' birth, that their son was the Son of God. Knowing a person well helps reduce our anxieties for them because we can better predict how they will behave, and we know their capacity to handle the challenges life might present to them.

As you gather as a family, have fun playing the game "How well do you know me?" Take turns trying to stump one another by asking family members questions about yourself, such as "What is my favorite memory of a family vacation?" "Given a choice, what dinner menu would I pick?" "If I could travel anywhere in the world, where would I go?" One member of the family might prepare and read the questions aloud as each person writes down the answers. Family members then take turns guessing the answers, playing this game as a quiz show. Observe that one thing about families is that we learn to know each other well.
